<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Basohli is a town in kathua district in the state of jammu and kashmir. Earlier it was named as Vishawasthali. A Famous Sikh Mughal Battle "BATTLE OF BASOHLI" was fought at Basohli. Basohli is situated(Lat. 32 30 300:Long. 75 49 000) on the right bank of river Ravi, presently the reservoir of the Ranjit Sagar Dam constructed across the river at village Thein. From the topographical point of view, it is situated on the Shiwalikh Hills and is surrounded in the north by Bhaderwah town of district Doda connected 160kms road, delineated by Jammu lesser Himalyas, in the east and south east by the two adjoining states of country, Himachal Pradesh and Punjab respectively which will have better road connectivity in near future through a magnificent and secnic bridge over the river Ravi which has been recently completed.Basohli was an independent state founded by Raja Bhupat Pal who had cordial relations with the contemporary rulers of Nurpur, Chamba Mandi, Kangra etc. as well as with rulers of jammu kingdom. During his time, diplomatic and cultural relations were developped with these states. The healthy and rich cultural religious heritage of Basohli reflects from monuments, temple, caves, sacred and secular ponds. The state remained famous for its other traditions like paintings (Chitterkala), astrology, classical and folk songs and dance. In the field of art, miniature painting and murals, the artists of Basohli were the prolific producers. Basohli is mostly known for its Paintings and Pashmina shawls. It is considered as one of the first school of "Pahari Paintings". The birth of Basohli painting has generally been ascribed to Raja Kirpal pal (in late 17th century). The general themes of Basohli paintings is the Vishnu incarnation and Gita Govinda of Jayadeva. Most of these paintings are being preserved in the Punjab Museum Patiala, National Museum New Delhi and in Dogra Art Gallery Jammu. The painter Nainsukh ended his carrier here in Basohli only. One of the french traveller who visited Basohli during 19th Century talks about the large and good looking Bazars of Basohli. It is the oldest and historical town of Duggar Desh.

- Facility of WiFi for students as well as all the faculty members.
- Availability of First Aid for the students.
- College Bus facility is available for the students.

- The college is situated in a remote area.
- Lack of research opportunity for teachers.

- No funds received from the UGC even after obtaining to 2(f) & 12(b) status.
- As the college is undergraduate, the placement rate of students is low.
- Due to the adverse climatic conditions (frequent strong winds), the survival of vegetation is low.
- The college faces the scarcity of water during the summer as the water pump is about 3 Km away from the college campus.
- The college lacks permanent faculty.

Institutional Opportunity

- As the college is situated in a rural area and aims at imparting quality education to the students, so, a greater attention is paid on polishing their communicative skills and enhancing their academic abilities.
- To raise the academic level of college through introduction of new courses.
- To utilize the expertise of faculty members in formulating value added and ICT based courses.
- To strengthen the promotion activities towards competitive examinations, banking, insurance and civil sectors.
- To provide students with enough agility to become global players.
- To motivate the faculty to indulge in research orientated activities.

- To construct separate blocks for Commerce and Geography streams.
- To construct more smart class rooms.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The university structures the educational modules and the constituent's college needs to execute it according to the rules. As the institution is the constituent part of university of Jammu. The college does not play any role in curriculum designs however college can give feedback and suggestions about the curriculum time to time.

The institution makes every efforts to fulfill goals and missions of its own by effectively implementing the curriculum as framed by the university, the college undertakes various steps such as preparing a comprehensive curricular and co-curriculum calendar with necessary working committee to implement the same.

Since ours is affiliated college, even though we can't take part in framing academic syllabus the college has various committees which consists of regular meetings with the experts of industries, Ngo's, etc. based on committee suggestion. The college has organized various co-curricular activities like debate competitions, seminars, field surveys, educational tours to inculcate practical knowledge to the students. For effective transactions the college organizes the student's enrichment, programmes. The feedback from the students is obtained both orally and in written format and other stake holders communicates their feedback at appropriate meetings.

The objective of curriculum is always to provide quality education for students. The institutions ensures that the goal of curriculum imparted through innovative teaching methods such as power point presentations, discussions, workshops, usage of Wi-Fi facility, library etc. The institution guarantee that the students are refreshed and updated in this regards to the most recent patterns in their area of specializations.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college has very transparent processes for admission, as the admission is done online and follows all the rules and regulation of affiliating university and Department of Higher Education, J&K.

The college prints its prospectus at the beginning of the academic session and all the information regarding admission and its rules & regulations are also uploaded on college website.

Govt. Degree College Basohli caters to needy student community from far flung areas of sub district Basohli, J&K. The influx of students from other states is very low as the college is at its infancy stage.

Innovative and creative approach is adopted by the college in class room teaching as well as in field works. A large number of teachers have qualified national level test and state level test like NET and SET and a few have PhD and M.phil to their credit. The teaching faculty of GDC Basohli is continuously updating with new methods of teaching by attending refreshers courses, faculty developments programmes, conferences and workshops etc. The field trips, subject tours and visits to historical places are permanent feature of the college.

All the reforms regarding UG programmes are implemented in letter and spirit. The external practical as well as theory examinations are conducted as per the affiliating university norms under the overall supervision of head of institution.

The academic calendar is always adhered to programme/course outcomes for all programmes/courses, offered by the college, are regularly communicated to students. The college gives top priority to learning outcomes. Both formative and summative methods of assessments are provided. Regular class tests, internal assessments, seminars and debates are conducted to enrich the competency of the students. The IQAC monitors the achievements of learning outcomes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

This criterion seeks information on the policies, practices and outcomes of the institution, with reference to research, innovation and extension. It deals with the facilities provided and efforts made by the institution to promote a 'research culture'. This criterion includes five key indicators- Research mobilization for research, Innovation ecosystem, Research publication and awards, Extension activities and Collaboration. Our college is a young institution and progressively moving ahead for transfer of the knowledge and providing efficient ecosystem to the students. In the above mentioned key indicator- Innovation ecosystem, our college has organised various field trips to impart the practical knowledge. The college has also organised extension lectures by eminent faculty to cultivate the knowledge and skill among the students. In the another key indicator-Research publication and awards, the college faculty has achieved success in the area of publications and further they have published more than 30 research articles in various national and international journals.While 14 research articles have been notified on UGC referred journals, additionally, our college teachers have attended various national and international conferences, during last five years. In the key indicator, Extension activities, our college has conducted various activities in the surrounding communities and sensitize students towards social issues that enable them to received awards and recognition from Govt. /recognised bodies. Our college has conducted various extensions and outreached programmes such as Swachh Bharat, AIDs awareness, Gender issue etc. in collaboration with industry, community and non-Govt organization through NSS/NCC/YRC with active participation of the students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Having a better infrastructure and learning resources of any institution play an essential role in supporting the teaching-learning process. Our institution has adequate facilities for infrastructure and other physical learning resources though college has newly established. Our college building is well structured, constituting of 10 classrooms and 1 seminar hall, 6 laboratories, 1 library and 2 separate toilet both for girls and boys. Apart from this the college has big playground which used for multiple activities likes games and sports, cultural or other activities. The college administration has installed 25 benches in the ground and to ensure the cleanliness in the vicinity of the college has installed 24 dustbins, green and blue, former for wet waste and other for dry waste. It also has a well established library with collection of 5988 books related to various subjects as well as containing reference books, general knowledge books, dictionaries, encyclopedia, etc. and also provides different newspapers and magazines. The well equipped Smart Classroom with podium, projector and Interactive Board with the capacity of 100 students utilized for different activities like seminars, workshops, celebrations, etc. The grant for the development of the infrastructure is allocated from the state government. The Wi-Fi facilities for faculty as well as for students are also provided. The college has 31 computers and students-computer ratio is 18:1. The games and sports facilities like badminton, cricket, volleyball, carom, etc are provided to the students. The students have also brought laurels to the college by winning in the intercollege tournament organized by University of Jammu. There are proper established system and procedure for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and supports facilities-labs, library, etc, as learning resources in which college committees works together and also monitoring its progress.

Student Support and Progression

The college strives for the wholesome development of the students in all spheres. In order to cater the academic, psychological, professional and financial needs of the students, various initiatives have been taken up by the college from time to time. The college supports the students by providing services like provision of extra classes to the students, creation of guidance and career counseling committee, grievance and redressal cell. The college also provides support to the students through anti-ragging committee, sexual harassment committee etc. In order to secure the future of the students and their placement in different fields of interest, the career and counselling committee of the college has conducted coaching classes for competitive exams like JUET with active involvement of the faculty members of the college. The library of the college also provides a rich stock of book reserves of academic interest of the students and also for the preparation of examinations of high repute like KAS, IAS, banking etc.

The students belonging to SC, ST and OBC category have also been provided financial assistance from various governmental organizations. With the kind support of Prof. R. S. Jamwal, worthy principal of the college, financial aid has also been rendered in the last session to the students belonging to the weaker sections from the general category for the first time, by the college.

The college has taken a very healthy initiative by creating college presidium for the involvement of the students in various academic and other co-curricular activities. The college further promotes the active participation of students in various cultural and literary activities.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Government Degree College, Basohli is a Government institution that comes under the orbit of Higher Education Department of Jammu and Kashmir. The Higher Education Department regulates year-wise budget and provide funds according to the requirements of the college. At the apex level, higher Education Department, Government of J&K is the governing body. The Commissioner Secretary Higher Education Department convenes periodical meetings for framing the plans and policies to improve the standard of educational qualities in the College. During the course of meetings, suggestions and feedback are sought from stakeholders to augment the teaching learning process. The Principal of the College believes in collective leadership and decentralized governance. The Principal conducts staff meetings at regular interval to have threadbare discussions about future action plans for successful attainment of stated vision and mission. Execution of final plan is being done with the help of various Committees formed for the purpose. Moreover, the Principal convenes review meetings to take stock of progress reports. The Principal conducts various Committees and all the staff works in unison to accomplish stated vision and mission. The Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC) keeps a regular tab on the academic aspects and activities of the College. It devises and formulates plans relating to future academic growth and sustenance of quality. The staff secretary of the college plays an important role where issues related to academic matters and overall development of the College in general are taken up. The management seeks the confidence of the staff secretary in implementing certain key targets. The non-teaching staffs give their full service in preparation of salary bills, keeping accounts, student's data and various other functions of the office. The whole process of fund management is supervised by the Principal of the college. Auditing is not done periodically and it is in the domain of AG office Jammu.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has always pioneered in displaying the best institutional values and practices.. The institution is committed to sustainable development and to addresses most of programmes related to developmental issues in small and large endeavors. The engagement of college to social and environmental issues is very evident and is lauded from various quarters. The college is committed to provide a safe and conducive work and academic environment to students and its employees is extremely alert to matters pertaining to any kind of harassment and gender sensitivity The College promotes gender equity and sensitivity through various programmes like Beti Baccho Beti Padhao etc. Several activities are conducted for the promotion of national values such as Republic day, Independence day, National youth day, National Integration day, Hindi divas etc. In order to address the global environmental awareness and to promote green practices in and around the college campus, the lawn development and beautification is actively working. Keeping in view of broad aspects of clean and green environment, a mega plantation drive was held in college campus and it comprise in three phase manner and more than 500 hundred plants were planted in college campus in different locations such as herbs, shrubs, shade loving and locally medicinal tree species. For environmental awareness among the students, college conducts field visits/studies on various burning environmental issues.

The college faculty and students have responsibly engaged with local people and fulfilling its role in making knowledge and information to community.

The Govt. Degree College, Basohli is a mutlifaculty institution with arts, science and commerce departments. The college runs three programmes B.A/B.Sc./B.Com offering 23 subject combinations in arts program and 8 subject combinations subjects in science program along with commerce course in under graduate level to cater to the requirements of the students.

The college is permanently affiliated with the University of Jammu and an effective curriculum delivery is ensured by a well planned and documented mechanism like admissions, curriculum, class works, and examination and declaration of results of all the semesters. Further, all the HODs of the concerned subjects are the members of BOS committee of the University of Jammu.

At the beginning of the academic session, admission committees for various semesters are constituted so as to run a smooth and students friendly admission process. The admission to the students is given keeping in mind their past learning experiences and interests. The concerned committee of the college prepares the time table of all the semesters in such a way that a proper student teacher ratio is maintained in each section. 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

The students of NCC and NSS play an important role in extension education in the local communities through play, Nukkad Nataks and other awareness programmes. Environment and Sustainability: - The college offers compulsory courses on environmental education in the first year of all undergraduate programmes. In pursuance to CBCS guide lines, the college has also

introduced optional skill enhancement cources on solid waste management in the second and third year. These course are instrumental and play an important role in the understanding of various environmental and ecological aspects such as sustainable development, environmental pollution, disaster management, various laws and protocols pertaining to the conservation of natural resources (renewable and non-renewable).

The departments of Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Geography and EVS focus on environmental sustainability and teach the students about various global environmental issues.

Human values:-The teaching profession is one of the most esteemed profession and a huge responsibility. They are the role models for the young generation and sets example for them. Basic human values should be inculcated in the students while teaching in the classrooms. Compassion, cooperation, friendlinees, smiling, courage, truth, honesty, loyalty, caring for each other, all of these qualities are there and they need to be nourished and brought out. - In order to sensitize the newly admitted students about the programme structure, internal and external examination schemes, varied program courses and career opportunities after completing under graduate courses, the teaching faculty of GDC Basohli address the students in their respective classes. Through, the college prospectus the evaluation process is also made clear to the students. Formative evaluation designed to test the cognitive skills of the students and is based on tests, assignments, quiz, field trip reports, seminars and practicals. It makes the students more innovative and improve the student's performance in the annual examination.

The college has a uniform scheme of evaluation for all the examination held in the institution.

A copy of the test and assignment is returned to the students after evaluation. The evaluation is done by giving due perception to the behavioural aspects and communication skills of the students along with their performance in their respective examinations.

Under the University rules, a student can apply for re-evaluation of his / her answer sheets if he /she feel under awarded and not satisfied with the results.

The college plans its teaching, learning and assessment strategies at the beginning of the academic year and the execution and monitoring of the same is done by the administration with the help of the IQAC. The institution puts every effort to ensure regular strength presence of the students in the classrooms and laboratories. The student's academic performance is monitored by organizing group discussion, presentations, assignments and class test. The college is regularly preparing data about the students learning outcomes. The IQAC monitors the students learning outcome and the assessment is based on the student's feedback. The students learn from each other, the teacher enriches the process whereby the deficiencies and learning of the students are also improved. Through, the IQAC monitors and ensures the achievements of learning outcomes. After assessing the students in connection with learning objectives, teaching methodology is changed to improve upon and the focus is on learner centric strategies. The teaching faculty use internal evaluation mechanism not only for evaluating the student's performance but also for initiating measures for bringing about qualitative improvements in teaching learning process.

2.6.2 Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution

Response:

The tools and the methods in the assessment measuring the attainment of each programme outcomes and programme specific outcomes are mentioned. So far as the methods of program outcomes / program specific outcomes they are assessed with the help of relevant courses through direct and indirect methods. The knowledge described by the outcomes of university examination is compared with the performances of

the students during internal assignments and if the committee finds any infirmities, necessary measures are taken to rectify the same. The college teacher records the performance of each student on each course outcome throughout the semester. Average achievement in university examination is 80% and 20% in college assessments. The tools used for assessments of program outcomes / program specific outcomes are as under.

- University Examination Methods: The University at the end of each session conducts examinations, which are based on results published by them. The course outcomes are measured on the basis of course attainment level fixed by the programme.
- **Direct Method:** After the completion of each unit, an assessment is given to each student to explore the library about the course and contents in standard reference books. The concerned teacher ensure that most of the students are able to complete their assignment fairly

3.4 Extension Activities

For that, we have now 10 class rooms and 06 laboratories. A fully AC ICT enabled smart class room with the capacity to accommodate approximately 100 persons has been established. The science departments of the college (Botany, Chemistry, Physics and Zoology) are provided with spacious laboratories, faculty rooms, Technician rooms and stores along with all the basic equipments and Wi-Fi connectivity. The Computer department has a functional laboratory with desktops and PC tables with proper sitting arrangement and internet facilities through Wi-Fi connectivity to fulfil the needs of the students. The department of Geography has a Laboratory and all the necessary equipments like globes, chart maps, relief maps, survey instruments for conducting various surveys etc. The various departments of the college have also organized field trips and surveys for enriching the students' knowledge and providing practical experiences in a constructive way.

The College ensures best utilization of budget allocated for the infrastructural maintenance by holding regular meetings of concerned committees in order to plan and monitor the developmental projects. The Heads of the Departments prepare the proposals as per the requirement of their respective departments. The concerned committee meetings are to be held to monitor the progress of the development of each department. The Principal and the college development committee proposes the infrastructural proposals to the concerned authorities for approval and permission. The high authorities sanctions funds based on the requirements, students' strength and the nature of the academic programmes offered by the institution. The college development fund is utilized for the repair and maintenance of furniture, building and equipments. The external executive agency prepares the proposal and estimated cost of plan constructional projects and submitted to the Head of the Institution. The Higher authorities approve the proposed plans and allocate the funds for the execution of work. An effective monitoring system of the College ensures the optimal utilization of budget allocated. As far as the maintenance of computers is concerned the outside technicians are contacted for major or minor repairs in the college, whereas software issues are resolved by the computer faculty of the college. The head of the college along with the concerned committees systematically regulate the annual maintenance and repair of the college infrastructure.

For the effective internal coordination and monitoring mechanism, the college promotes the culture of participative management for effective functioning. All activities in the College are carried out with active participation of the Principal and the faculty members of the college. The elected staff secretary participates in all meetings and raises issues of concerning staff. Participatory management is ensured through the various committees and each committee is headed by one convenor and four to six members.

There are 26 committees and each committee has the power to decide the student's admission, purchase of books, purchase of contingency equipment, organising of various programmes etc. Periodical meeting are held for chalking out plans to accomplish the assigned task.

The college is a Government institution solely funded by the Higher Education Department, Government of Jammu and Kashmir. This Annual Performance Report serves as basis for career progression later.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

The welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff in our college are governed by the Govt. of J&K. Staff members appointed before 2010 are under Pensionary benefit, contributory general provident fund and gratuity benefit. Whereas, employees appointed after 2010 are eligible to join contributory pension scheme NPS. Female staff can avail maternity leave for six months and male staff can also avail the benefit of fifteen days paternity leave. The teaching staff can avail various leave as per the norms prescribed by UGC and Govt. of J&K. Similarly, non teaching staff members are also eligible for various leaves as per the leave rules of Govt. of J&K. There is also a provision for accumulation of non-availed leave and get it en-cashed later. Recently, Govt. of J&K has signed a Memorandum of Understanding with JK Bank to offer banking services at concessional rates to all State Government employees. Faculty members are encouraged to attend National and International conferences, workshop etc by head of the college as as a

part of exchange of knowledge. Those faculty members who have not been able to attend orientation and refreshers courses due to academic work in college are allowed to attend such program later on preferential basis. Moreover, teachers are also encouraged to participate in Board of Studies Meeting held at Jammu University.

Mobilisation and utilisation of funds in our college is governed by various financial rules and regulations prescribed by Govt. of J&K from time to time. The College is required to frame estimated budget as per the requirement at the outset of the every financial year. The estimated budget is prepared by accounts department of the college and is further checked by the Principal and then send to the Higher Education Department for necessary approval. After requisite discussion on estimated budget in Higher Education Department, they release annual budgetary funds for the college. The institution strives to meet the requirement for promoting the gender equity through various actions plan and take initiatives with a purpose of creating awareness about them. Though the college has continued some of the earlier practices, in this regard, new initiatives are also taken up like setting of Sexual Harassment Committee.

The sexual harassment committee has been constituted in the college campus to address any complaints from the students, teaching and non teaching staff and takes necessary action. The college has zero tolerance towards any such transgression. With prime objective of the safety of students in general and particularly female students, the regular counseling of the students is undertaken which guides, enlighten and motivates the students about various types of psychological, social and mental harassment.

The college is committed to provide a safe and conducive work and academic environment to its female students and its employees. An Anti ragging committee is also framed in the college to watch the students regularly that they are not involved in ragging anywhere in the campus especially girls.

Counselling:

At the commencement of the every academic session the college frames its career counseling and guidance committee with main objective to guide and provide counseling to the students. Recently the college administration has introduced the concept of mentoring the students in which at least 25 students have been allotted to each student so that their mentor may resolve the issues of students in general and female students in particular. Students have been greatly benefitted by such interactions and are successful in overcoming their stress/ problems with better positivity and confidence. Regular counseling is being done under student – mentor programme. Grievance Redressal Committee carries out regular counseling to the students particularly to the female students in groups and even at individual level.

The college library provides the facilities for career development. It has a rich repository of standard books and magazines to enrich the students for various competitive exams. The faculty members deliver many motivational lectures on regular basis and help them to prepare for entrance exams. Special free coaching classes are arranged for students by IQAC committee for their preparation, so as to get admission in various PG courses in different streams.

Solid waste management:

With the aim of maintaining cleanliness and hygienic conditions in the college campus, the college administration with the help of NSS volunteers has installed separate dustbins for collecting bio-degradable and non-bio-degradable waste material in all classrooms, labs, lawns etc for the collection of solid wastes. Every day collected waste materials are dumped in pits located at two different sites. One near the septic tank and other near the college canteen.

Liquid waste management: The institution provides facility for the management of liquid waste generated in the laboratories, washrooms, toilets in the form of septic tank located in the outer boundary of the college. Liquid generated through washing, cleaning and urination is safely disposed off in the septic tank.

E-waste management: Since the college is at its growing stage, having no separate provision/funds for disposal of **E**-waste material.

The Govt. Degree College Basohli is a young college, situated on the sloppy hills of Shivaliks. So far we have not any rain water harvesting structure in the college. Presently we are using college supply water from college's own bore well which is situated 2km away from the college for drinking, watering plants, flowers etc. The college is planning for constructing a big reservoir near the boundary of the college where the outlet of all flowing water falls. The area has been already ear marked for the storage tank and shall use the water of storage tank for watering the flowers, plants, and lawn development etc.

Response:

In order to promote the global environmental awareness and the green practices in and around the college campus, the lawn development and beautification committee is actively working. Keeping in view, the broad aspects of clean and green environment, a series of plantation drive were launched in the college in rainy season.

The plantation drive comprised of three phases:

In first phase, college lawn development committee in collaboration with Eco Task Force Basohli, conducted a massive plantation drive in the month of July.

In this drive, the NCC, NSS Cadets, the students, staff members (teaching as well as non-teaching) participated with great enthusiasm. In this phase special stress was laid on planting medicinally important plants.

In continuation with greening of campus, the second plantation drive was held in the last week of July with the active participation DFO Basohli, under 69th Van Mahostav celebration. In this phase special emphasis was laid on planting ornamental and shade loving and trees species. The major attraction of this drive was planting of Silver Oak, Sukhchain, Cassia, Delonix, Gulmohar, Indian coral tree, Dalbergia, Kachnar, Bottle brush, Pinus, Chinar, Teak, Tecoma, Alstonia etc.

In the final phase of plantation drive, flower beds were made in the different locations within the college. In this plantation drive, the main focus was laid on planting of herbaceous flowering plant species as well as non flowering ornamentals herbs and shrubs. For this many ornamental plants species such as Guldhoddi, Mother in law tongue plant, Celosia, Impatiens, Cranum, Euphorbia, Tagetus hybrid, different hybrid varieties of Rose, China rose, Bougainvillea of different shades- red, white and pink, the stem cutting Nerium plants of different colors were planted along the border of main play field. In total more than 400 plants were planted in college in different locations.

Public transport: The college provides bus facility for transportation of students on minimum bus fare. The college Bus plies regularly from Campus to the Basohli town and its adjoining villages within a distance of 28km. Most of the students from Basohli town come to college by public transport and rest used to come on foot. The college is well connected with the Basohli town by metallic road without pot holes.

Plastic free Campus:

The students and the staff were encouraged to avoid the use of plastic within the college. Large numbers of cleanliness drives were also organized with the help of NSS and NCC unit and slogans about cleanliness and plastic free campus.

Paperless Office:

In order to minimize the use of papers the college has developed its own website. Most of the notifications regarding admissions, regular classwork, practicals, time tables, internal assessment date sheets and all other important information pertaining to students community are displayed on the college website from time to time. The college management also provides bulk sms facility to the students for providing information at individual level.

Yes, the College campus celebrates the national festivals, birth anniversaries and memorials of great Indian personalities like Mahatma Gandhi, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel, Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan with great fervor.

Various national festivals like The Independence Day, The Republic Day and Gandhi Jayanti are also celebrated with great enthusiasm.

Focusing on the unified diversity of the nation, the Government had announced the birth anniversary of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel on October 31 to be celebrated as Rashtriya Ekta Diwas (National Integration Day) every year. On this occasion, Govt. Degree College Basohli also celebrates Ekta Diwas in the college. The day starts with the "Walk for Unity", event by the NCC and NSS volunteers, followed by the college students to pay tribute to the efforts made by Sardar Patel to unite India.

Cleanliness Drive or Swachhta Abhiyan has been organized by College on 2nd October (Birth of Mahatma Gandhi), where all the members of the society along with college staff members march in the entire campus, cleaning the campus. The college also celebrates International Youth Day and Hindi Diwas.

On 5th September, college campus celebrate Birthday of Dr. Radhakrishnan's birthday as Teacher's Day with great fervour. The students organize a cultural programme for the teachers and the Guru-Shishya parampara is celebrated.

All the current events and their processes including admission details, examination date-sheets are displayed on the college website as well as the college notice board. Admission and selection process of

the students is done through the use of online admission software by the admission committee which ensures that all the eligible candidates are enrolled in the subject of their choice according to the merit list. The admission process is absolutely transparent and follows all the norms and procedures laid down by the affiliating University i.e University of Jammu.

Dates for the submission of internal assessment awards are notified on the notice board and faculty accordingly submits the assignments. Internal assessment awards are displayed on the notice board for students before forwarding to the university. All the external practical examinations are being conducted by the faculty members appointed from different colleges as per affiliating university norms.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe at least two institutional best practices (as per NAAC Format)

Response:

With the changing trends in the admission process, the offline admission system is replaced by the online mode. The replacement of offline admission is done because it was time consuming and laborious as it involves various steps such as collection of admission form, filling and fee submission etc. The main objective of implementation online admission system is to provide transparent, fast and accurate way to keep vital record of each and every student in a digital and technological way. The online admission system save man power and also promotes paper friendly nature.

The process of online admission initiates soon after the university notification which is being forwarded by Nodal Principal of Jammu Division. Thereafter, the college admission committee comprising of experienced faculty members manages the smooth conduct and completion of the admission process.

Various subject combinations offered by the college, details of the admission process and intake capacity of the students is uploaded on the website on regular basis. The students register themselves on the website by taking the benefit of online medium of admission even from their native places. Merit list of the students is displayed on the website as well as on the notice board of the college.

Title of the Practice 2: Uniform as the Best Practices.

The Govt. Degree College Basohli, is a co-educational institution where there is a provision of uniform for both male and female students. The main objective of introduction of uniform is to maintain discipline, cleanliness, identity and a sense of equality among the students irrespective of their religion, cast, creed and economic status. The facility of the uniform in the college helps in identifying outsiders among the college students. The NCC cadets, NSS volunteers and sports participating students also have the provision of separate uniforms.

Title of the Practice 3: Identity cards: The Govt. Degree College Basohli also manages to provide the provision of hanging identity cards to the students with three different colored neck bands so as to identify their semesters. Further, the ID cards carry all the important information such as Name, Parentage, DOB,

Gender, Contact details of the respective candidates. The main advantage of ID cards is to maintain discipline, uniqueness and also to avail the facilities of issuance of books from the library. Moreover it also helps the students to avail concession in fare from the public transport.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

Response:

The Govt. Degree College Basohli is situated about 3 kms from main Bus stand. The college started functioning regularly in 2005. It caters quality education to the students of rural and hilly areas of Basohli and its adjoining areas. The majority of student belongs to rural background and they are not aware of quality education. No case of sexual harassment as well as ragging is reported from the college so far which is positive sign for attracting female students from these far flung areas.

During the previous period students of Basohli used to pursue their education in the colleges of Kathua and Jammu, but with the establishment of Govt. Degree College Basohli students are availing the benefit of higher education at their doorstep in the respective college. The teaching faculty of the college is highly qualified, dedicated, and devoted to provide the quality education to the students of all caste and religion. Although the infrastructure of the college is still getting upgraded but despite of all these constraints it does not fail to provide safe and congenial environment for imparting quality education. Various prescribed skill enhancement courses are being taught for the overall development of the students.

The college also provides a well equipped smart class room and as well as ICT lab which enables the students about the awareness of multimedia, MS word, power point etc. Workshops, seminars, debates, symposium are also conducted for the overall development of students, teaching and non teaching faculty.

To create interest among the students about the field knowledge, the college administration regularly arranges field, industrial, zoological, botanical and geographical trips. The institution also makes an attempt to carry economic and social surveys in the adjoining areas. To further enrich and broaden the spectrum of knowledge among students, a series of guest lecture have also been arranged by IQAC.

The college provides sports activities like cricket, football, volleyball, kho-kho etc. to the students and they are also encouraged to participate in various co-curricular activities at inter-collegiate /University level.

The college website is maintained by the Computer Applications Department so as to maintain the transparent functioning of academic, financial and extracurricular activities. The student welfare and scholarship committee of the college provides the benefits of scholarship to the aggrieved students.

The NSS and NCC unit of the college conducted a large number of extension and outreach activities such as Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, rallies on imparting Voter education, Essay, Poster and slogan writing competition etc, in order to aware them to become responsible and good citizen. The college bus committee provides the bus facility to the students at very nominal fare. In the last, the infrastructural development of the college is in progress and shall continue to work for the welfare of the students in particular and society in general as per the future demands.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

The college has a unique practice of providing insurance cover of Rs.1,00,000/- (One Lakh Only) for accidental death and Rs. 20,000/- (Twenty Thousand Only) for accidental medical expenses on payment of one time premium of Rs. 47/- only, which is quite affordable to students community. In case of any mishap the college management readily forward the case to the concerned agency, so as to ensure speedy financial assistance to the concerned student, if any.

Concluding Remarks :

The Govt. Degree College, Basohli is a young college which was established in the year, 2005. The college has 11 permanent faculty members, out of which 3 teachers are having the degree of Ph.D, 3 are M.Phils and 5 are PG. Most of the teachers are NET and SET qualified. The college is in its growing stage and the below mentioned features are incorporated in the future action plan:

- 1. To enrich the Department of Commerce and to encourage the young citizens of Basohli to opt the Commerce stream.
- 2. Since, the Geography subject is in great demand so, the IQAC committee has proposed to create its separate block with modern laboratory and smart class room.
- 3. No doubt, the number of divyaang (specially abled) students is very less and the college is still not divyaang friendly. Therefore, the IQAC committee has proposed to make the college friendly for such students by making necessary arrangements like the provision of rest room, ramps and other facilities as per their requirements.
- 4. The college runs the discipline of Computer Application also as one of the key subject in its curriculum. Thus, the IQAC committee of the college has planned to construct a separate well furnished laboratory for the students of Computer Application.
- 5. The IQAC committee of the college further proposes to construct an indoor stadium for the students of the college, keeping in view the maintenance of their physical fitness, as the college is situated in a rural area.
